Directions to the February Meeting

- Take I-84 to Exit 68 (look for UConn signs)
- Turn south on Rt. 195 (left if you're coming from the east, right from the west)
- Drive about 7 miles to the University of Connecticut campus
- Turn right on N. Eagleville Rd (traffic light just after a church)
- Life Sciences is across the street from the cemetery. Park on the street, and enter through the doors in the center of the building.

Growing tips for February

After a long winter of being inside and in windows or under lights, many plants will start showing some signs of being worse for wear at this time of year. One thing that often happens about this time are insect infestations. The insects come in with the plants that are brought in when the weather gets cold, and we don't inspect them well enough in December with everything going on for the holidays. By the time early February comes around, the insects have multiplied and become a problem. Even plants that are well inspected when brought in can be covered with insects this time of year.

The most common insects to become a problem this time of year are aphids. Since many people do not want to use chemical sprays in the house, especially in winter, control often can be a problem. The key can be simply to control the number of insects and damage they may do, not to eradicate them, until spring.

To help control the number of insects, I use two main methods. I will often use a cotton swab (Q Tip) dipped in simple rubbing

alcohol to kill insects. Wiping the insects will dislodge them and kill them, and then to be sure I put the q tip back in the alcohol with ant insects attached. This works especially well with scale and mealy bugs. Both of these seem to be more of a problem on nepenthes than anything else.

The other simple method to control the numbers of insects is simply to wash them off. I have used a spray bottle filled with water and a few (2 or 3 only!) drops of dish soap to first spray the affected parts of the plant, then use the sprayer in the kitchen sink to wash the insects off. Occasionally, I will simply use the sink sprayer alone, if the infestation isn't too bad. The insects then are washed down the drain, and the plant put back to its space to grow.

So, inspect your plants now and see if they need the extra care to eliminate those insect troubles now.
