## **CP Tidbit for May: Decorating with Carnivorous Plants**

We all love to show off our plants whenever we can, and talk about them with people who are simply amazed at these wonders of nature. But it's usually said that all of the plants we enjoy grow in specific climates and conditions not suitable for typical growing in or around a house where anyone can enjoy them. There are, however, many ways and numerous plants that can be brought out into the open and enjoyed with friends and more around the house. Here are a few simple thoughts and ideas that we can use to bring the plants we love onto center stage where we live and work.

**Nepenthes outside:** Not as landscape plants, but Neps do well as potted plants on decks and hangers in the warmer part of the year. I already have several highland and intermediate Neps outside on the deck, and outside my south facing kitchen door. Even with temperatures that may still occasionally drop to the upper 30's, these plants (for example the Holland Hybrids, *N. ventrata*, maxima hybrids) can do well in a sunny place. Just be sure to give them lots of water, especially if they are hanging plants.

**Grouping Nepenthes:** One way I enjoy showing off Nepenthes that are in small (4") pots is to group several in a large wooden slat or orchid basket. You can spice up an unimpressive arrangement by lining it festively with Spanish moss. This also allows you to change the plants occasionally, should one show signs of decline. Again, remember to

water very often - I usually water these plants each morning. The small pots can dry out quickly, especially on hot sunny days.

**Hanging sundews?!?** Yes, REALLY... a hanging sundew. Take a 6", 8" or even a 10" hanging plastic pot and a black garbage can liner. Fold the liner over a few times on itself, and place into the plastic pot, so that the liner hangs over the top of the pot. Fill the lined pot with a potting media (I use 50/50 sand and peat moss, or straight peat moss) and soak it with water. Then take some forked leaved sundews (*D. binata*, *D. multifida*, or a mix), and plant them in the pot. *D. binata* loves wet compost and full sun, so place the pot in a sunny place after letting them adjust for a few days in the shade, and water it so that it stays wet. You'll be astounded by the growth and the long arching stems hanging down from the hanger. It is especially beautiful at night, with a light or moonlight behind it, so consider this when placing it somewhere.

**CP centerpieces:** Entertaining tonight? Take some of the carnivorous plants in your collection, put them in a nice basket or clean decorative pots, and use them as a centerpiece. I've seen things like *Sarracenia* show up on tables (Wild Bill and Dena's wedding!), a basket of cape sundews looks beautiful at night in the lights, and a few small *Nepenthes* grouped together with vines training can be spectacular. Just find attractive pots or baskets that let you slide the growing pots into them, and decorate with Spanish or sheet moss to fill in space and hide what you don't want.

Just some thoughts on bringing the plants we love to grow and show out into our worlds!

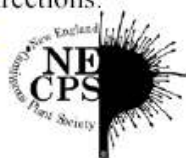
# New England Carnivorous Plant Society

## NECPS Library Policy

The loan period for all items including: books, magazines, and videos are 1 month with one renewal period. No renewals are allowed for books, magazines and videos on reserve.

All material will be stored at a secure location deemed by the library committee and confirmed by the Executive board.

Failure to bring back books within 2 months will result in loss of borrowing privileges!

A valid membership number must be presented by any member wishing to check out any NECPS library materials. Cards are not transferable. You are responsible for any materials checked out in your name.

NECPS library patrons may take out one (1) item as they are willing to be responsible for. NECPS library patrons may sign up for one (1) additional book such that at the end of the meeting if no one has already signed up for the item you will be allotted to take that item for the duration until the next meeting. When there is a high demand for a particular item, there will be a limit of one (1) item per person. The only exception to the above rules are for approved functions by the Executive board that are sponsored by the NECPS may reserve any and all material providing a months notice is given to guarantee that material will be available.

The NECPS Library reserves the right to determine charges for lost or damaged materials and the right to deny borrowing privileges to anyone who has library materials overdue for more than two (2) months to the NECPS library or owes fines amounting to more than ten dollars (\$10.00) from the NECPS. The NECPS library also reserves the right to deny borrowing privileges to any parent or guardian whose child and/or children has the above delinquencies.

All material taken from the NECPS library is the responsibility of the NECPS library patrons. For one of a kind items NECPS library has the right to refrain from loaning the material and may keep it as a reference item to be viewed solely at meetings and functions.
