President's Message

Summer is finally here! Well, at least unofficially, with the arrival of Memorial Day. I always think summer really arrives with the hot weather, which we had this last weekend. I saw 94 F on my travels up and down the Route 95 corridor last week – that counts as hot and signals summer in southern New England. And what does summer mean to us here?

It means that it's time to get out and experience the outdoors! How many native carnivorous plants have you seen in the "wild"? (There are very few really wild places left in Southern New England.) Have you ever tried to log the places you've seen them, and how many you've seen? Do you take your own pictures of the plants you see? How about a picture of you standing in a bog with your first wild *Utricularia*? Your first *D. rotundifolia*? Do you think Charles Darwin fell in love with these plants in his study, or while studying them in the wild?

June is the perfect month to start afield, to go and observe plants in their natural setting. *S. purpurea* in the sphagnum bogs, along with *D. rotundifolia*. and *D. intermedia* in seemingly any wet, marshy bog.

See if you can spot some of the many different *Utricularia* in the bogs and ponds around the region (Hint, look for yellow flowers first and then for the tiny aquatic traps). In any case, get out!

When I talk to groups about growing different plants -- orchids, carnivorous, or just about anything -- I always say you have to know how the plant grows in the wild to really understand how to grow it. Understanding the plant's requirements and ecology comes from understanding what it wants and needs to thrive. The single best way to understand that is to see the plants in the wild. It's an experience that cannot be replicated in the greenhouse, the windowsill, or even the garden. It comes from getting wet feet, swatting deerflies, and seeing the plants in their home.

So get out this summer. See the plants. And see the rest of the NECPS members this Saturday at our meeting (we always enjoy people with muddy shoes).

NECPS Program for June

1. **The inner workings of a carnivorous plant pitcher** are often a mystery even to dedicated growers and botanists. This month, our own Emi Kurosawa will give a presentation titled “Enzymes from Pitcher Fluid” that will shed some light on the topic.
2. **Do you know what’s in your water?** How about Calcium, Sodium, Pesticides, stormwater runoff or soil contamination in your water?

Total Dissolved Solids (TDS) is a measurement of the combined content of all inorganic and organic substances contained in a liquid – in molecular, ionized, or micro-granular suspended form.

If you would like to know about the quality of your water, bring a 1 to 2 ounce sample to the June meeting and Don Gallant will test it with a TDS meter. There will be a TDS chart and information about Total Dissolved Solids available.

NECPS Library Policy

The loan period for all items including: books, magazines, and videos are 1 month with one renewal period. No renewals are allowed for books, magazines and videos on reserve.

All material will be stored at a secure location deemed by the library committee and confirmed by the Executive board.

Failure to bring back books within 2 months will result in loss of borrowing privileges!

Any member wishing to check out any NECPS library materials must present a valid membership number. Cards are not transferable. You are responsible for any materials checked out in your name.

NECPS library patrons may take out one (1) item, as they are willing to be responsible for. NECPS library patrons may sign up for one (1) additional book such that at the end of the meeting if no one has already signed up for the item you will be allotted to take that item for the duration until the next meeting. When there is a high demand for a particular item, there will be a limit of one (1) item per person. The only exception to the above rules are for approved functions by the Executive board that are sponsored by the NECPS may reserve any and all material providing a months notice is given to guarantee that material will be available.

The NECPS Library reserves the right to determine charges for lost or damaged materials and the right to deny borrowing privileges to anyone who has library materials overdue for more than two (2) months to the NECPS library or owes fines amounting to more than ten dollars (\$10.00) from the NECPS. The NECPS library also reserves the right to deny borrowing privileges to any parent or guardian whose child and/or children have the above delinquencies.
